Students can apply for University Accommodation as part of their application to study with us. We cannot guarantee students a place in Halls of Residence, although priority will be given to exchange students staying for a whole academic year. https://www.westminster.ac.uk/international/student-exchanges/accommodation
Students coming for the second semester should be prepared to find private accommodation in London.

Nevertheless, it is worth applying and all exchange students who apply will be placed on a waiting list.

If your application is successful and you are offered a room, you will receive a set of instructions to secure your room. You are responsible for ensuring that the student accommodation team receives your acceptance and deposit before the deadline specified on your tenancy offer. You must pay for your room for the duration of the semester.

If your application is unsuccessful, you will receive notification from the Student Accommodation team, who will also send you information about finding alternative accommodation in London.

Many international students choose to live in privately rented accommodation. The University provides free help and advice once you have arrived.

Evidence of English Language:

If English is not your first language, you will need to provide official proof of your English language ability. Proof of English must be in the form of a recent IELTS, Pearson, TOEFL or Cambridge English Language Examination score.

Students who are applying from an Erasmus+ exchange partner, and hold an EU/EEA passport, are able to provide evidence of English language ability in the form of a formal letter of reference from their home university outlining their language ability.

*Please note: Students studying in semester one only will be set alternative assessment in the case of a module with an exam. This means it may be possible to complete all assessment before the start of the winter vacation. Students will be able to leave from this date. Semester one contract dates for housing end at the official end date of the semester and any student selecting the option to live in University accommodation does so on the express understanding that they are liable for the full contracted period.

Please also note: Some coursework deadlines may be set in the first half of January. Students with deadlines after the winter vacation who have to leave London before these deadlines should endeavor to complete all assessment before they leave. If a student decides not to do this, the student must ensure that they submit the assessment via the method of submission defined in the Module Handbook by the UK time of the deadline (ie Greenwich Meantime).

Do students need a visa?	
	The kind of visa you will need will depend on the length of your student exchange.
	Students studying a course less than six months will require a Standard Visit Visa (£95 if required to apply for pre-entry clearance for this visa)
	Depending on your country of origin you may need to apply for your Standard Visitor Visa before coming to the UK, or you may be able to request this at the UK Border.

	If entering the UK on a Standard Visit Visa students are advised not to transit via the Republic of Ireland as they will pass through UK immigration, and therefore not receive the correct entry permissions for the UK. Students who have made frequent or successive visits to the UK on a Standard Visit visa in the last 12 months, should seek advice before applying for another visa to avoid a refusal. Please contact the Education Abroad Team in this instance.
	Students studying a course more than six months will require a Student Visa (£348, plus a £470 Health Surcharge which covers use of the NHS)

	Living Costs
Accommodation Costs	The average weekly spend on rent in London for a student is between £140-£200. Halls of Residence costs vary but estimated weekly rent is between £180-£250.
	All halls of residence include the costs of all utility bills, council tax and wireless internet connection and are self-catered.
	Privately rented accommodation will differ entirely depending on location and room/property type.
Transport options & Costs	A rough estimate of weekly travel costs when living in London will be between £25-£35.
	London Underground, overground, DLR, tram and bus: purchase an 'Oyster Card' (available at most stations) which can be topped up with credit for either pay-as-you-go travel or travelcards. If you are only using your oyster card for single journeys (instead of purchasing for the week/month) or even if you forget your oyster card, you can use the contactless function on a debit card or a mobile device to travel for the same price as on an oyster card. If your bank card shows the contactless payment symbol, you can use it to pay as you go straight away. You'll pay an adult rate fare (no student discount on this method) Many contactless cards issued outside the UK can be used to pay as you go for travel (overseas transaction fees may apply)

	London also has a cycle hire scheme 'Santander Cycle Hire' which is one of the cheapest ways to travel in London if you like to cycle. The scheme consists of an access fee plus a charge for the time spent using the bike. For more information visit https://tfl.gov.uk/modes/cycling/santander-cycles
Taxes (Council tax)	If a student rents private accommodation then they may be required to pay Council Tax on top of their rental costs. Full-time students are exempt from paying council tax (the course must last for at least one academic year). However if someone other than a full-time student occupies the same property, a discount of 25% will be applied, but they will have full legal responsibility to pay the remaining 75% of the bill. If two or more occupants are not full-time students, the full bill will be obligatory for them to pay.
	The amount will vary depending on the valuation of the property and which 'band' it falls under (A-H).
	NB: If you move to England before your course has commenced, you will be liable to pay council tax up until the start-date, unless you live in student accommodation.
Food Costs	There is a wide range of quality supermarkets to choose from in London to suit most budgets. The cheaper stores are Asda and Tesco but all supermarkets have both budget and premium ranges to choose from.
	Students are encouraged to share food costs with their flat mates which will considerably reduce the expense. By doing this, you can expect to spend around £30.00 a week but realistically, it is safer to expect to spend a bit more than this.

Books and Study Equipment	The library is extensive and will stock the core text books which can be borrowed for a limited amount of time. In most occasions, it is very likely that most of your required books can be borrowed from the library rather than buying them. If your book is not available, the library staff can request them for you for a later date. The libraries are accessible 7 days a week. Opening times for the library counter will vary depending on the campus but all the libraries are
	open 24 hours a day during term time.
	Buying online, such as from Amazon, is also advisable where good quality second hand options are also available.
	Study equipment can be purchased from a whole range of stores and can be reasonably priced. Look out for stores offering student discount, such as Ryman or Paperchase.
Entertainment	London is one of the most exciting cities in Europe offering a whole breadth of leisure activities.

Information	medical needs etc, before coming to the UK.
	If you are on a course of less than 6 months duration, you are not entitled to primary medical care. However, any overseas visitor is entitled to emergency or immediately – required treatment.
	Students registered for courses in the UK of 6 months or more are entitled to primary

medical care provided by the National Health Service (NHS) and also emergency or immediately-required treatment. This applies to Exchange students studying for a full academic year.

Students will receive further information via our pre-arrivals emails, information on general health services in the UK (including emergencies) will be found in the exchange handbook you will receive upon arrival.
