Students can apply for University Accommodation as part of their application to study with us. We cannot guarantee students a place in Halls of Residence, although priority will be given to exchange students staying for a whole academic year. <a href="https://www.westminster.ac.uk/international/student-exchanges/accommodation">https://www.westminster.ac.uk/international/student-exchanges/accommodation</a>
Students coming for the second semester should be prepared to find private accommodation in London.

Nevertheless, it is worth applying and all exchange students who apply will be placed on a waiting list.

If your application is successful and you are offered a room, you will receive a set of instructions to secure your room. You are responsible for ensuring that the student accommodation team receives your acceptance and deposit before the deadline specified on your tenancy offer. You must pay for your room for the duration of the semester.

If your application is unsuccessful, you will receive notification from the Student Accommodation team, who will also send you information about finding alternative accommodation in London.

Many international students choose to live in privately rented accommodation. The University provides free help and advice once you have arrived.

Supporting Documents Required	- Personal Statement - Official Transcript - Copy of Passport (main photo page) - Proof of English Language ability - Portfolio of work (for students applying for practical modules in Media Art and Design or Architecture and the Built Environment)  Evidence of English Language:  If English is not your first language, you will need to provide official proof of your English language ability. Proof of English must be in the form of a recent IELTS, Pearson, TOEFL or Cambridge English Language Examination score.  Students who are applying from an Erasmus+ exchange partner, and hold an EU/EEA passport, are able to provide evidence of English language ability in the form of a formal letter from their home university outlining their language ability. Visa Information	
Do students need a visa?	This will depend on where you are travelling from and where
	you currently reside.
	If a student <b>does</b> hold an EU/EEA passport then you do not require a visa to study.
	If a student <b>does not</b> hold an EU/EEA passport or nationality then they will probably require a student visa.
	The kind of visa you will need wills depend on the length of your student exchange. Students studying a course more than six months long will need a Tier 4 (General) Student Visa.

	If your exchange is shorter than six months, you can enter the UK as on a Short Term Study Visa. Depending on your country of origin you may need to apply for your visitor visa before coming to the UK. 	Living Costs
Accommodation	The average weekly spend on rent in London for a student is between £140-£200. Halls of
Costs	Residence costs vary but estimated weekly rent is between £180-£250.
	All halls of residence include the costs of all utility bills, council tax and wireless internet connection and are self-catered.
	Privately rented accommodation will differ entirely depending on location and room/property type.
Transport options & Costs	A rough estimate of weekly travel costs when living in London will be between £20-£30.
	London Underground, overground, DLR, tram and bus: purchase an 'Oyster Card' (available at most stations) which can be topped up with credit for either pay-as-you-go travel or travelcards. If you are only using your oyster card for single journeys (instead of purchasing for

	the week/month) or even if you forget your oyster card, you can use the contactless function on a UK debit card to travel for the same price as on an oyster card.

	London also has a cycle hire scheme 'Santander Cycle Hire' which is one of the cheapest ways to travel in London if you like to cycle. The scheme consists of an access fee plus a charge for the time spent using the bike. For more information visit  https://tfl.gov.uk/modes/cycling/santander-cycles
Taxes (Council tax)	If a student rents private accommodation then they may be required to pay Council Tax on top of their rental costs. Full-time students are exempt from paying council tax (the course must last for at least one academic year). However if someone other than a full-time student occupies the same property, a discount of 25% will be applied, but they will have full legal responsibility to pay the remaining 75% of the bill. If two or more occupants are not full-time
	students, the full bill will be obligatory for them to pay.
	The amount will vary depending on the valuation of the property and which 'band' it falls under (A-H).
	NB: If you move to England before your course has commenced, you will be liable to pay council tax up until the start-date, unless you live in student accommodation.
Food Costs	There is a wide range of quality supermarkets to choose from in London to suit most budgets.  The cheaper stores are Asda and Tesco but all supermarkets have both budget and premium ranges to choose from.
	Students are encouraged to share food costs with their flat mates which will considerably reduce the expense. By doing this, you can expect to spend less than £30.00 a week but realistically, it is safer to expect to spend a bit more than this.
Books and Study	The university has a book store in the Marylebone Campus. They sell most core subject books
Equipment	at a reasonable price and discounted second-hand books. Once you have finished with your books, if you have retained your receipt, you will have the option to display your used books on the second-hand shelf in the store, choose a price and let the book store pay you your profit into your bank account if the book sells. They will take a small fee of around 20%.
	However, the library is extensive and will stock the core text books which can be borrowed for a limited amount of time. In most occasions, it is very likely that most of your required books can be borrowed from the library rather than buying them. If your book is not available, the library staff can request them for you for a later date. The libraries are accessible 7 days a week. Opening times for the library counter will vary depending on the campus but all the libraries are open 24 hours a day during term time.
	Buying online, such as from Amazon, is also advisable where good quality second hand options are also available.
	Study equipment can be purchased from a whole range of stores and can be reasonably priced. Look out for stores offering student discount, such as Ryman or Paperchase.
Entertainment	London is one of the most exciting cities in Europe offering a whole breadth of leisure activities.

Student Discounts Available	Travel: National railcards can be purchased for great discounts on rail fares. Example: the 16-25 Young Persons' Railcard gives 1/3 off of most fares and expires after one year.

	All valid student cards will allow students to benefit from student discount in most high street stores and even some bars and restaurants. The general discount is 10%, however, this will
	vary from store to store or during promotional periods.
	Your Westminster ID card is usually valid however some stores only accept NUS card (this also
